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# Message from the Executive Director



This year saw important change at Romero House. For the first time in 25 years, our housing capacity grew. We partnered with the City of Toronto's shelter division to open a new home called Edna Lane. Here we have been able to welcome eight new families at a time, bringing our capacity up to 80 beds.

The timing worked well. We saw decreased demand for our immigration and settlement services for people living outside Romero House, as the number of new refugee claimants in Toronto began to fall and supports from other organizations caught up. This allowed us to shift our services from our walk-in program to our expanded housing program. We welcomed more kids to kids club, more people to our monthly community potlucks, and provided wraparound support to more families in our homes.

This expansion is in line with the strategic plan that we shared last year. The first pillar was to discern the right size for our live-in community. We wasted no time in experimenting with growth! And we continue to reflect on how this building--with its larger size and different funding model--affects who and how we are. Our lease on Edna Lane goes until December 2026 and we will find the next most graceful step in Romero's evolution before then.

None of this would be possible without our supporters: neighbours who give care baskets to new moms, volunteers who teach English, donors who trust us to do what is needed, and partners who find ways we are stronger together. Thank you to all of the people who made our work this year possible. To be the recipients of such kindness and generosity brings joy to all of us at Romero House.

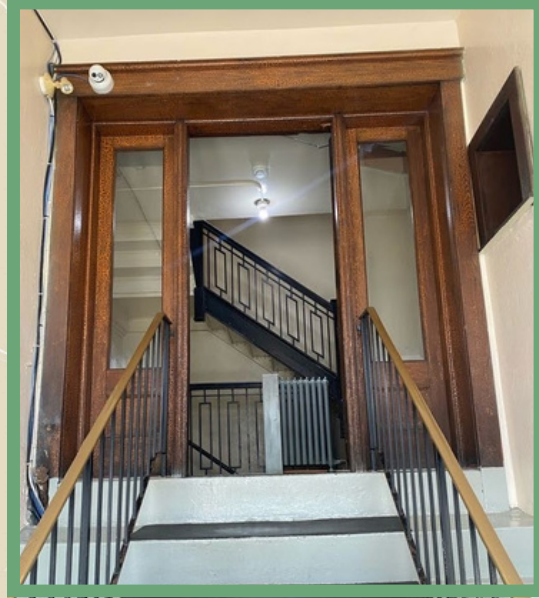
The heart of Romero House continues to be our transitional housing. We house refugee claimant families for up to one year, acting as a bridge between emergency shelter and permanent housing. We have 18 one, two, and three-bedroom apartments spread over five buildings in the West Bend neighbourhood of Toronto.

For the first time in 20 years, Romero House grew. We opened a small apartment building called Edna Lane and were able to welcome 8 more families at a time. We are very happy to be partnering with Toronto Shelter and Support Services to make this possible.

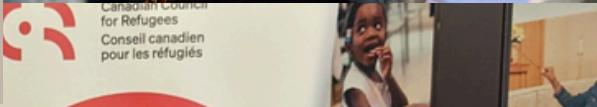

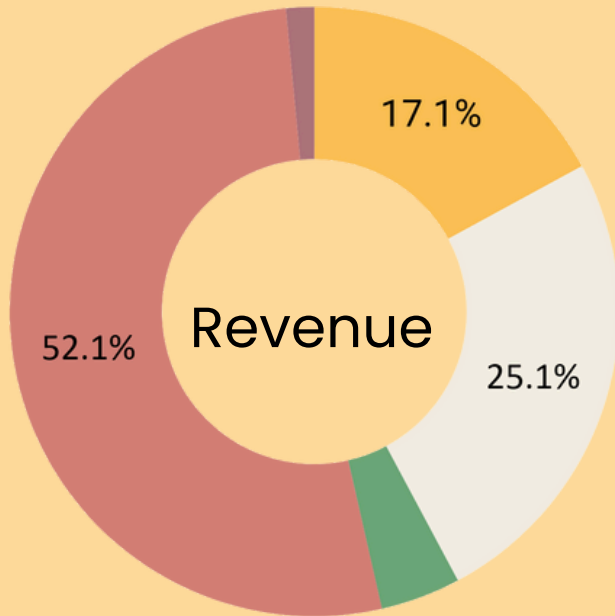

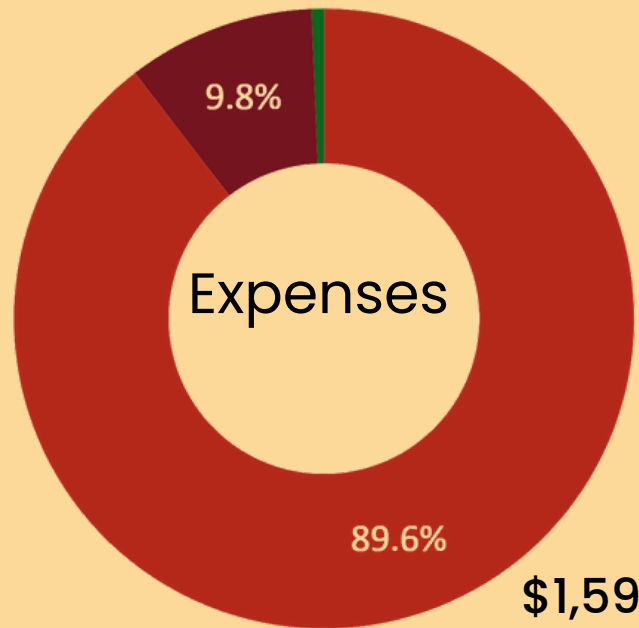

# 2024–2026 Strategic Plan

## Progress Report

In our 2024–2026 strategic plan, we set out 4 ambitious goals to guide our work:



### **PILLAR #1: Discern growth**

Strengthen and possibly grow our core practice of providing transitional housing with live-in staff and volunteers.



### **PILLAR #2: Innovate our people model**

Continue experimenting with different staffing and volunteer models to find the best fit for our current needs.



### **PILLAR #3: Strengthen funding**

Improve our evaluation, communications, and revenue systems to support our program needs.



### **PILLAR #4: Make CHP sustainable**

Improve the Community Host Program and find sustainable funding.

To advance our Strategic Plan in 2025–2026, we will:

- Evaluate our new housing project, Edna Lane, and establish our ideal size, both in terms of residents and staff
- Pilot replacing the Worker Program with more House Coordinators and live-out staff
- Continue to strengthen our internal evaluation capacity by undertaking a large-scale evaluation project of Edna Lane
- Cultivate funding support for the Community Host Program, continuing to operate at partial capacity until additional funding is secured
